An Essential Step for Having Peace of Mind



Your own peace of mind is critical to a successful project. With it, you will enjoy a standard production time (and its lower cost), your project will go smoothly, and you will be pleasantly surprised when viewing your new plaque for the very first time. Without peace of mind, well, let's just say some things may not turn out as you expect. Here is how you can set the stage for your own peace of mind...

Start Early

Starting early is the best "Peace of Mind" advice we can give you, because it reduces the chances of mistakes and allows enough time for all of the various pieces of your project to come together.

You should allow for design time prior to approving a design, then 4-5 weeks for regular production, plus a few days for transit time. Rush production is available if necessary, but our Design Team will help you plan appropriately to avoid any such extra expenses.

Event Dates - Set Them After Your Plaque Arrives

Delays in production and shipping are rare, but they do happen, so we recommend waiting until after your plaque arrives before setting dates for ceremonies, dedications or other events. Without such deadlines, something as simple as a weather delay or mis-routed package won't have any effect on your event – or disrupt your peace of mind.

Dates in the Inscription - Use Only the Month and Year

The safest way to include your ceremony date in the inscription is by listing only the month and year. For example, consider using "July 2012" instead of "July 15, 2012".

Why This is Essential

Taking this essential step will set the stage for your project to proceed with no deadlines, no pressure, and no anxiety about whether it will be finished on time. In other words, it is essential to your own peace of mind.



An Essential Step for A Successful Event

If circumstances will not allow you to wait until after your plaque arrives before setting an event date, then you can still have a successful event with some appropriate planning...

Notify Your Designer – During Your FIRST Contact

When your designer knows your event date (and the date you must receive your plaque) they will help you plan accordingly. For example, they can get a layout and quote to you quickly, give you an ordering deadline that allows enough time for production, compare the cost of rush production to upgraded shipping so you can decide which is best, etc.

Many more options are usually available at this stage than there are at later stages - options that can keep your overall cost as low as possible – so be sure your designer knows your event date during your very FIRST contact.

Allow for a 1-2 Week Safety Margin

Your designer will be able to estimate your plaque's arrival, but this estimate does not factor in delays of any kind. Therefore, a safety margin of 1-2 weeks is ideal between their estimated delivery and your event. The wider your margin, the better chance you have of receiving your plaque prior to the event.

Why This is Essential

If your designer is not aware of your event date during your first contact, your plaque may not arrive in time. For your own peace of mind, and the success of your event, make sure this information is a part of your initial project details.



An Essential Step for Getting Your Thoughts on Paper

If the inspiration for your plaque inscription comes naturally to you, then by all means just sit down and begin putting your thoughts in writing. If it's a challenge, however, and you seem to be drawing a blank, relax. You just need to get a few thoughts on paper...

Start a List

Start a list of ideas, and keep it with you at all times. Your mind will come up with things right out of the blue, so write down every single thought you have. Skip nothing. This will be the basis of your plaque inscription, but your notes do not need to be perfect. They're just the raw ingredients. Don't even try to write a formal inscription yet. Your mind needs time to digest this information. For now, be confident that it will all make sense when it needs to.

If someone had made notes about the Ronnie Lane Gaspard plaque on the cover, they may have included something like this:

- Born and raised in Crowley.
- We traveled quite a bit.
- Business sometimes took him overseas.
- Lived in Texas for 10 years.
- Couldn't believe how many sympathy cards.
- Etc.



Why This is Essential

Everything you need to know about this person is already in your mind. It may not be flowing into words at this very moment, but it will once you begin thinking about it more often. The human brain has a way of working on such things behind the scenes, when you aren't even aware of it.

Why Now

In the next steps, you will be finding the perfect photograph and thinking about other inscription elements. By starting your list now, you'll be able to write down thoughts as they occur to you.

An Essential Step for Finding the Perfect Photograph




Although it will be nice if you already have a perfect photograph, there are plenty of options available if you are having difficulty finding one.

Photographs of Your Person

If you are honoring a living person, the best way to get a perfect photograph of them is to have one taken. If this isn't possible, then begin an in-depth search. Besides your own photo collection, contact family, friends, co-workers, etc. Explain your goal, and ask them what they may have. You might be surprised.

Some of the best photos are candid shots that reveal a little bit of their character. Therefore, consider any good photograph of the person, regardless of what else is in the scene or the angle from which it was taken. Our skilled designers are able to isolate people and use them separately, or place them in other scenes entirely.

Photographs of a Scene (optional)



Scenes add substantial depth and insight to the story you are sharing, especially when they show a person's interests or accomplishments in life. They are not absolutely necessary, however. The Pamela J. Smoak plaque, for example, works extremely well without a scene at all.

Unless you already have a photo of your person in a great scene,

one will need to be created by carefully combining separate photographs. This opens up all kinds of possibilities with the scene photograph, including taking your own, having one taken, finding it in someone's collection, or using a stock image.

Why This is Essential

While photographs are not required on plaques, they do offer viewers a strong visual connection with the subject and his or her interests or accomplishments in life. They add tremendous depth to the story you are sharing.

An Essential Step for Stunning Photo Relief[™] Images

The quality of a Photo Relief[™] image machined into your plaque is based entirely on the quality of your original photograph. For stunning Photo Relief[™] images that draw people in for a closer look, use the highest quality image available.



The photo on the left was submitted as an extremely high resolution digital image file with perfect lighting, high contrast, and crisp focus. The photo on the right is a scanned and enlarged section of a printed image. It has lower resolution and lacks focus and detail.




As expected, the Photo Relief[™] sculptures have significant differences. The left plaque is crisp and detailed while the right has less contour and definition (just like the original photos). Color differences are due to an oxidized finish (left) vs. painted finish (right).

Why This is Essential

People must be drawn in for a closer look in order for you to begin the process of sharing a person's life. Although any photograph can be used on a plaque, highquality photographs contribute greatly to how stunning your plaque will be, and how much attention it will get as a result.

An Essential Step for Personalizing Your Inscription



People love stories about other people, so the more personal and in-depth a plaque can be, the more interest it will create.

Ideas for Personalizing Your Inscription

- Scripture verses, especially this person's favorite.
- Quotations from this person or someone they admired.
- Their lifelong work on missions, projects or causes,
- Activities they loved to do, a place they liked to visit, or hobbies they enjoyed.
- Some of the best inscriptions have simply described a person's character.
- Friends and family members are a great source of ideas. Ask them what they remember most about this person.

Concentrate on the content for now, not on how it will be sized or placed.

How Much to Include

Great inscriptions convey just the right amount of full, rich content, and that amount varies from plaque to plaque. If you need a second opinion in this area, your designer should be able to offer some words of advice.

Why This is Essential

Sharing someone's life is an extremely personal expression. It's a small glimpse into their world, and your hope is for people to discover and remember what you consider to be their most endearing qualities.



An Essential Step for The Perfect Mounting Location

There are several factors you should take into consideration when determining the perfect mounting location for your plaque...

Space Available

The most visually pleasing settings have enough open mounting space for plaques to fit comfortably in the size you are considering.

Visibility and Physical Access

Your plaque should be located where it gets the visibility you desire and is able to be read from the distance where most people will be viewing it. This may require a visit to the site in order to make note of the best locations.

Consider whether you would like the general public to have full access to your plaque, including the ability to stand close and even touch the surface, or whether you prefer to make it visible yet inaccessible. Natural barriers such as plants or a bordered walkway may be helpful if you prefer to keep people a few feet away.

If vandalism is a problem, consider deterrents like hedges of thorn-bearing bushes, or extreme measures such as an enclosed display of some kind.

Exposure to the Elements

Limiting your plaque's exposure to weather, roof drainage, fountain overspray, etc. will prolong the life of its finish. Also, maintenance personnel should be advised that pressure washing of any kind can cause damage.

Why This is Essential

The perfect mounting location will make your plaque available to all who want to discover the story you have to share, yet protect it from a variety of things that may distract from this story. All this requires is some advance thought and planning.



An Essential Step for Balancing Your Plaque With Your Mounting Area

Balancing your plaque size to your mounting area will significantly improve the overall appearance of your setting. This can be as simple as orienting it horizontally or vertically, then adjusting the overall size to fit comfortably within the available space.

Measurements Your Designer Will Use to Achieve Balance

Horizontal and vertical measurements of your mounting area (the width left to right, and the height top to bottom) are all a skilled designer needs. Supplying a photograph such as the one above is optional, but will allow for even closer balance.



Why This is Essential

When your plaque is a natural fit to its mounting space, your setting will be in balance, pleasing, and inviting to all who discover it.



An Essential Step for Balancing Your Inscription With Your Plaque

Balancing your inscription with the shape and size of your plaque follows the same principles as the previous step, balancing your plaque with your mounting area. Combined, they are the secret to outstanding plaque settings that invite people in for a closer look.

Inscription Content

Even though your designer is responsible for balancing your inscription, fitting the inscription contents into this space depends on the quantity of information you provide. Too little information may make for a stark plaque, while too much may result in a cramped, overwhelming presentation that nobody will want to read.

Think about the amount of inscription contents you would like to include, compare them to sample plaques, and consider asking your designer for their advice as well. There is an appropriate quantity for every plaque, and they will help you find it.

Why This is Essential

Achieving proper balance requires a skilled designer who is personally driven to reach this goal, as well as an appropriate amount of inscription content. When both of these factors are present, your plaque will be pleasing to the eye, easy to read, and inviting to those who discover it.

An Essential Step for Flawless Inscriptions

A flawless inscription will make your day when it arrives. You will finally get to see and touch your new plaque, and you will immediately experience a sense of accomplishment for a job well done. This will only be possible by diligently proofing your inscription.

Proofing

Keep errors at bay by proofing your inscription from top to bottom, and double-checking all names, dates and numbers.

When finished, reverse the process and work your way through your entire inscription backwards, very slowly, word-by-word. The key is to see each word individually, which causes errors to become obvious.



If your plaque contains individual names of people who can be contacted easily, you may

also consider getting signed approval from every one of them. When a person is asked to approve the spelling of their own name, you can be almost certain they will scrutinize it thoroughly.

If you still need reassurance, have a second person proof it also.

Why This is Essential

If you receive your finished plaque and notice an error, it will ruin your entire day. Spending the necessary time to find mistakes now, before it goes into production, is going to make your day when it arrives with a flawless inscription.

An Essential Step for Remembering Every Detail

This is a simple way to avoid that nagging feeling that always seems to crop up after placing your order - that you forgot one little detail.



Ordering Checklist

Your layout and quote will include an ordering checklist for you to follow when placing your order. It is designed with first-time buyers in mind, to make sure every single detail is taken into consideration.

Print it out and literally check off each step as you complete it. If you have additional details to remember, then add them wherever appropriate.

Special Instructions



Remembering every detail also means following any instructions provided by your designer, such as placing a deadline-specific order by a certain date. Because your delivery date hinges almost entirely on that order date, write it on your checklist and enter it in your calendar, as well.

Why This is Essential

Following a checklist ensures that every item on the list will receive your full attention when necessary. It also removes that nagging feeling that some little detail is being overlooked.

An Essential Step for Confirming Your Order



This step is already listed on the ordering checklist that accompanies your layout and quote. However, it is so important that we listed it here to make sure you are aware of it.

Confirm Your Order

Even though the vast majority of e-mail, faxes and US Mail get delivered as expected, there is an unfortunate reality that none of these systems work 100% of the time. Therefore, plan ahead by always following up on the orders you place. Just call or e-mail your designer and ask this question:

"Did you receive my order?"

Specifically ask for verification that it arrived, and make sure you receive a response.

Why This is Essential

Confirming your order ensures it is in production and scheduled for delivery when you need it. This is the only way to discover an order that never got placed, and prevent the delays that would occur as a result.

Smile... You're Going to Love this Plaque!



Sharing a person's life with future generations can be a very personal, emotional and even rewarding experience. Therefore, we want to do everything possible to make sure your plaque is planned, designed, manufactured and delivered exactly as you intend it to be. Appendix: Questions & Answers

When you see a memorial plaque for the first time, your natural reaction is to pause and study the details. There really is something captivating about them, something that draws you in for a closer look. More often than not, curiosity is what follows. The conversation usually goes something like this...

How are these plaques made?

There are many plaque types, and each one is made differently. Engraved plaques, for example, are made with an industrial CNC milling machine. Cast plaques are formed by pouring molten metal into a mold. The recessed areas of Etched plaques are created with an acid spray. Anodizing and other techniques are used on other plaque types.



Lettering on all plaques can be raised or recessed, and photographs are represented in many different forms. Your designer will recommend what is best for your specific needs and budget.

Can they be used outside, and how are they mounted?

Yes, they can be outside, and there is a mounting method for almost any surface. There are even concealed mounting methods, so no hardware is visible from the front.

What are they made of, and how much do they weigh?

Gold-colored plaques are available in bronze, brass, muntz and copper. Silver-colored plaques are available in aluminum, stainless steel and zinc. Weight varies from material to material, as this example illustrates:



22"x12" Bronze: <u>22</u> lbs.



22"x12" Aluminum: 8 lbs.

What size do I need?

The right plaque size depends on the amount of mounting space you have available (and its proportions), the contents of your inscription, and even your own personal preference. Therefore, it's best to choose a basic width as a general starting point (see below), then let other factors dictate the exact dimensions.



If you're the type of person who wants to be more precise, however, then make mockups of various plaque shapes using paper, cardboard or whatever you have on hand. Make various sizes and hang them in your mounting space, then stand back for a "big picture" look. This will help you quickly narrow down the best size.

I have a special person in mind. What would I need to get started?



Surprisingly, not as much as you think. The basic ingredients are only an inscription and your photos. As for the general design, just make note of any plaque examples you like, then call our Design Team. They will be glad to get your design started, and model it after any existing designs you point out.

How does the ordering process work?

It's very straightforward. Our Design Team will design your plaque based on your preferences. At no charge or obligation, a scaled layout and quote is then sent for your approval. Ordering is as simple as following the included checklist.



How much do they cost?

Your exact cost will be based on the size of your plaque, as well as its type, material, finish, etc. There are quite a few details involved, resulting in thousands of possible combinations – far too many to list here. Let's simplify things...

If you want the exposed areas of your plaque to be gold (the tops of lettering and borders, usually), follow the gold row left to right for average price ranges at four sample sizes. Note: We can make ANY size, not just the ones shown.

Turnaround Time →	As little as 5 working days with rush production, or just a few weeks for standard production. Plaques with sculptures or other complex graphics could take up to 8 weeks or more. Transit time is additional, as is the time required to approve special artwork (if required).			

If you want the exposed areas of your plaque to be silver, follow the silver row.
